- (3) Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Only PHA A PHA that administers more than 550 HCVs, was not designated as troubled in its most recent SEMAP assessment and does not own or manage public housing.
- (4) Standard PHA A PHA that owns or manages 250 or more public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceed 550, and that was designated as a standard performer in the most recent PHAS or SEMAP assessments.
- (5) Troubled PHA A PHA that achieves an overall PHAS or SEMAP score of less than 60 percent.
- (6) Qualified PHA A PHA with 550 or fewer public housing dwelling units and/or housing choice vouchers combined and is not PHAS or SEMAP troubled.

	Statement of Housing Needs and Strategy for Addressing Housing Needs: Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority (WMHA) hopes to use the Local, Non-Traditional Activities to address the local need for housing. According to the City of Wooster's 2023 Economic Development Plan there is a shortage of 2,117 units in the City of Wooster. Based on Waiting List applications 1- and 2-bedroom units are the most needed. Current zoning restrictions limit development in the City of Wooster, so development may be scattered throughout Wayne County. WMHA is working with a local real estate agent to determine available land in Wayne County for future development. Also, WMHA is seeking partnerships for a consultant to work with financing options for potential tax credit funding so that housing remains affordable. The development of new housing will update the housing stock and provide resident's with more affordable and accessible options.
	Rent Determination: The Admissions and Continued Occupancy Policies for Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority's Public Housing were updated to include the Public Housing Income Limit rules in compliance with Housing Opportunity Through Modernization Act of 2016 (HOTMA), section 103 and PIH-2023-03(HA).
	We will be adding the final rule implementation sections 102 and 104 HOTMA for January 1, 2025.
	Operations and Management: The Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority entered into a contract with D.L. Morgan & Associates to update our Housing Choice Voucher Administrative Plan and our Public Housing Admissions and Continued Occupancy Plan and continue to update these policies with federal regulation changes (Housing Opportunity Through Modernization Act of 2016-HOTMA and National Standards for the Physical Inspection of Real Estate-NSPIRE).
	Significant Amendment/Modification: Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority has a substantial deviation from the 5-Year Action Plan. Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority intends to dispose of the Public Housing property, Townview Terrace, Parcel ID 64-02236.000 located at 200 South Market Street, Wooster, AMP OH036000011. Timeframe for Disposition is by 12/31/2024. Townview Terrace is a State licensed Assisted Living facility which is contracted by Tri State Home Health LLC who depends Area Agency on Ageing for referrals. Currently those referrals have been slow and occupancy is well below the 97% causing an infeasible operation and no longer effective for a public housing building. Screened potential residents on the waiting list are refusing to move into Townview Terrace mainly because the building operates as an assisted living facility.

Statement Regarding VAWA

The Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority adopted revisions to its Public Housing Admissions and Continued Occupancy Policy and its Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Administrative Plan to address the requirement of the Violence Against Women Act. Those revisions were adopted by Resolution of the Board of Commissioners of the Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority on September 27, 2006.

The Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority notified residents of the Public Housing Program and the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program through written mail of the requirements of the Violence Against Women Act in May of 2007, and also incorporated that information in its Housing Choice Voucher briefings and Public Housing lease signing. All staff working with clients of the Public Housing Program and Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program were given training and all necessary information regarding the Act. Periodic recurrent training will be scheduled as appropriate.

The Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority does not offer any "activities, services or programs" that are intended to specifically help child or adult victims of domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking other than that required by law or regulation. The Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority always makes appropriate referrals when victims of domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking are identified.

The Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority has a working relationship with OneEighty and Every Woman's House, a local domestic violence shelter, that provides 24-hour services to child and adult victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and bullying. They provide a full range of crisis intervention, treatment, counseling, prevention and support services to individuals and families impacted by domestic violence and/or sexual assault. All services available through Every Woman's House are also available to male victims.

The Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority continues to review, update and revise its policies and procedures regarding violence against women as legislation or regulations enhance or revised guidance.

Other Progress:

On March 1, 2023 the Public Housing and Housing Choice Voucher Waiting Lists were closed. On April 1, 2023 applicant preference system was updated for Public Housing and Housing Choice Voucher Programs. On June 5, 2023 the Public Housing Waiting List was opened.

Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority has entered into a contract with Jonathan Zimmerman, SEA Associates, LLC to review current Payment Standards. The Extension of Certain Regulatory Waivers for the Housing Choice Voucher (including Mainstream and Mod Rehab) Program and Streamlined Review Process. HUD approved this waiver on June 30, 2023, increased Payment Standards were implemented September 1, 2023 for rent burdened families and October 1, 2023 for all other vouchers. This should potentially increase landlord participation in the Housing Choice Voucher Program.
